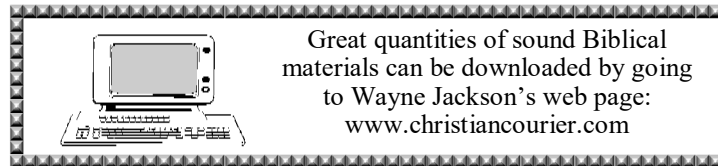

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THE JOPLIN SUMMIT 1984 AND RESTORATION FORUM XVI 1998

The 16th Restoration Forum was held at the Woodmont Hills Church in Nashville November 1-3, 1998. It was described by Rubel Shelly as a continuing dialogue among



Christian Churches and Churches of Christ. Yet, the speakers included L.H. Hardwick, Jr. of Christ Church (Pentecostal), a Roman Catholic Historian and Don Finto, the self-appointed apostle of Belmont Church, Nashville. J.E. Choate, a retired faculty member from David Lipscomb University attended the Forum as an observer and later gave this assessment: "Restoration Forum XVI proved to be a disaster marked by empty seats." The first of these current unity forums took place at Ozark College in Missouri in 1984. Those who planned it called it a "Summit" on unity. The following is an article I wrote at the time.
